New Braunfels Public Library Participating in Pilot Launched by the Aspen Institute

New Braunfels, TX - The Aspen Institute, an education and policy studies organization based in Washington, D.C., has launched a pilot initiative for its newest interactive engagement tool, an *Action Guide for Re-Envisioning Your Public Library*. The Action Guide is designed to complement the Institute's 2014 report, *Rising to the Challenge: Re-Envisioning Public Libraries*, available for download at http://as.pn/libraries. The pilot includes the following 23 library systems of varying sizes and serving diverse populations around the United States:

*SALS is an association of 34 libraries in New York serving the counties of Hamilton (pop. 4,700), Saratoga (pop. 224,900), Warren (pop. 65,000) and Washington (pop. 62,400).

"We are indebted to our pilot participants," says Amy Garmer, director of the Aspen Institute Dialogue on Public Libraries. "The involvement of these public libraries is so important as we move forward with our goal of helping public libraries to engage more deeply with their communities and inspire action to re-envision public libraries as key partners in all aspects of community life in the digital age."

"New Braunfels Public Library is pleased to be selected to be a participant in this very important initiative. The Action Guide that will result from the pilot project will help libraries of all sizes remain relevant in these fast, changing times," said Library Director Gretchen Pruett.

The pilot is designed to take place over 10 weeks and librarians can opt for a structured process or a self-paced initiative. The pilot will conclude in mid-November, and feedback from librarians and library directors will be incorporated in the final Action Guide and web site that will launch in early winter.

The Aspen Institute Dialogue on Public Libraries is a multi-stakeholder forum to explore and champion new thinking on U.S. public libraries, with the goal of fostering concrete actions to support and transform public libraries for a more diverse, mobile and connected society. The Dialogue is managed by the Aspen Institute Communications and Society Program, which focuses on projects and initiatives that address the societal impact of communications and information technologies and provides a multidisciplinary venue for considered judgment on communications policy issues.

The Aspen Institute is an educational and policy studies organization.
